

100 Things to Do with Children in London This Bank Holiday Weekend

London, a city brimming with history, culture, and endless possibilities, truly comes alive during a bank holiday weekend. The upcoming Early May bank holiday in 2025, spanning from Saturday, May 3rd to Monday, May 5th ¹, presents a perfect opportunity for families to create lasting memories together. This guide offers a comprehensive list of 100 diverse and engaging activities designed to entertain children of all ages and interests, ensuring a weekend packed with fun and adventure across the capital.

Outdoor Adventures in the City

London's magnificent Royal Parks provide expansive green havens for families to escape the urban bustle and embrace nature. **Hyde Park** ¹⁰ offers a plethora of activities. Younger children will delight in the Buckhill Playground ¹², while the renowned Diana Princess of Wales Memorial Playground ¹¹, with its iconic pirate ship, promises hours of imaginative play. It is worth noting that this playground's popularity often leads to queues, particularly during peak times like a bank holiday. ¹² The Diana Princess of Wales Memorial Fountain ¹³ offers a chance for little ones to splash and cool off (though walking in the fountain itself is not permitted). For those seeking a unique experience, Hyde Park also offers horse riding opportunities. ²⁰ Families can also enjoy a traditional picnic amidst the greenery ¹³, or rent boats and paddleboats on the Serpentine lake, where feeding the ducks is another beloved pastime. ¹³

Adjacent to Hyde Park, **Regent's Park** ¹⁰ boasts several playgrounds, including Gloucester Gate Playground ¹¹ with its thrilling long zip wire and natural play structures, the more traditional Hanover Gate Children's Playground ¹², and Marylebone Green Playground. ¹² Within Regent's Park lies the world-famous London Zoo ¹⁰, home to a vast array of animals. The park also features Queen Mary's Gardens ¹⁸, a stunning display of thousands of roses. Depending on the timing, the Regent's Park Open Air Theatre season might also be commencing ¹⁰, offering family-friendly performances.

Kensington Gardens ¹⁰ is another verdant gem, home to the aforementioned Diana Princess of Wales Memorial Playground. ¹² Visitors can also explore Kensington Palace ¹³ and its beautiful gardens, and discover the charming Peter Pan statue. ¹³ Further afield, **Richmond Park** ¹⁰ offers a different experience with its Petersham Gate playground featuring a unique elephant piano ¹¹, and the chance to spot wild deer roaming freely. ²⁴ Horse riding is also available in Richmond Park. ²⁰ In East London, **Greenwich Park** ¹⁰ provides a playground with a nature-inspired design. ¹¹ The park is

also conveniently located near the National Maritime Museum ²¹ and the Royal Observatory and Planetarium.²¹ Finally, **St. James's Park** ¹², situated near Buckingham Palace, offers a playground ¹² and stunning views of the palace ¹⁹, with the entertaining pelican feeding times being a particular highlight.²⁸

Beyond the Royal Parks, London boasts numerous other captivating green spaces. **Battersea Park** ¹⁰ features another popular Pirate Ship Playground ¹², as well as Battersea Zoo ¹⁴ and the thrilling treetop adventure of Go Ape.¹⁰ In West London, **Holland Park** ¹² offers an Adventure Playground ¹² for older children and a separate Toddlers Playground ¹² for younger ones, with the serene Kyoto Gardens being a particularly beautiful spot.¹² The **Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park** ²⁴ in Stratford provides a range of play areas, including the adventurous Tumbling Bay Playground ³⁶, the expansive Pleasure Gardens Play Areas ³⁶, a Climbing Wall ³⁶, and the mesmerizing Water Fountains.³⁶ For a more natural escape, **Highgate Wood** ¹⁸ offers tranquil forest trails, while the vast expanse of **Hampstead Heath** ¹⁰ includes swimming ponds ¹⁰ and plenty of space for exploration. Families can also enjoy scenic walks along the **Regent's Canal** ²⁸ or visit one of London's city farms, such as Mudchute Park and Farm ²⁴, Vauxhall City Farm ²⁹, Surrey Docks Farm ²⁷ for lamb feeding, or Brick Lane City Farm ²⁹, perhaps followed by a tasty beigel.

For those who enjoy active exploration, the Thames Path ⁴⁰ provides picturesque riverside views, and many local parks offer marked nature walks.²⁹ Cyclists can find numerous family-friendly cycle routes within and around London's parks.²⁰

To experience London from a different perspective, families can embark on a variety of boat tours and river cruises. **Thames Clippers (Uber Boat)** ⁴¹ offer hop-on hop-off services, with family tickets available ⁴², making it a convenient way to see many key sights from the water. **GoBoat** ³⁸ provides a unique self-drive boat hire experience in Paddington, Kingston, and Canary Wharf, and it's even dog-friendly, allowing families to bring their furry companions along with a picnic. For a historical and humorous journey, consider the **Horrible Histories - Terrible Thames** ⁴⁴ tour, although it primarily operates during school holidays and selected weekdays. The **London Eye River Cruise** ⁴⁵ is often combined with tickets for the iconic observation wheel. **City Cruises** ²¹ offer sightseeing day passes ²⁶, while **Thames Rockets** ²¹ provide a more exhilarating speedboat experience. Families looking for a leisurely canal adventure can opt for the **London Waterbus Company** ³⁹, which runs between Little Venice and Camden along Regent's Canal. For a more personalized experience, many companies offer family-friendly private boat tours.⁴⁸ The sheer variety of boat tour options ensures that families can select an experience that perfectly aligns with their

children's ages, interests, and desired level of excitement.

Immersive Museum Experiences

London's museums offer a wealth of opportunities for children to learn and explore in engaging and interactive environments. The **Science Museum**²³ provides free entry to its main galleries²⁴, making it an accessible option for families. For a more hands-on experience, Wonderlab²⁹ offers spectacular interactive exhibits (though it requires booking and a separate ticket). Retro gaming enthusiasts will enjoy the Power Up gallery⁵¹, while the Exploring Space gallery⁵¹ is open until early June 2025. The museum also features an IMAX cinema⁵¹ showing immersive documentaries and the Technicians gallery⁵¹, which explores behind-the-scenes careers in science. Younger visitors will appreciate the Pattern Pod³² designed specifically for toddlers.

Similarly, the **Natural History Museum**²¹ offers free entry²⁴ and is renowned for its impressive dinosaur exhibits.²³ The Volcanoes and Earthquakes gallery³⁰ features an exciting earthquake simulator, while Hintze Hall is home to the magnificent blue whale skeleton, Hope.⁵² The museum also provides engaging museum explorer trails and treasure hunts³⁰, and its newly opened gardens offer another space for discovery.⁵² Until February 2026, visitors can explore the fascinating Space exhibition: Could Life Exist Beyond Earth?²¹

The **British Museum**²⁴ offers free entry for children under 16⁵³ and provides various resources for families, including Museum Missions, explorer trails, and activity backpacks.⁵³ The Families Desk offers helpful information and resources⁵³, and the Ford Centre for Young Visitors provides a dedicated space for families.⁵³ On Saturday, May 3rd, 2025, the museum will host a free relaxed evening event featuring Bollywood dancing⁵³, and its Little Feet programme caters specifically to children under 5.⁵³

For transport enthusiasts, the **London Transport Museum**¹⁰ offers interactive exhibits for all ages.³⁰ While its play area is popular and can get crowded³², it provides a fun opportunity for children to engage with the history of London's transport. The **Museum of London Docklands**²⁹ offers free entry²⁹ and features the Mudlarks gallery³², a dock-themed soft play area that requires advance booking.⁵⁵ The **Young V&A** (formerly the Museum of Childhood)²¹ also offers free entry²³ and houses a fascinating collection of historic toys and childhood objects²³, along with interactive displays.²³ The museum also hosts ongoing family-friendly workshops like the Family Design Challenge until July 12th, 2025⁵⁷, SEND Play sessions until July 5th, 2025⁵⁷, Play Saturdays until July 19th, 2025⁵⁷, and Mini Play sessions for babies and toddlers throughout May 2025.⁵⁷

London is also home to many other engaging museums catering to specific interests. The **Postal Museum**²⁹ features the unique Mail Rail ride³⁰ through underground tunnels and the ticketed Sorted! The Postal Play Space for children under 8.¹⁶ The **Horniman Museum and Gardens**¹⁶ encourages children to touch museum objects³³ and boasts a playground and extensive gardens.³² Its Robot Zoo exhibition runs until November (ticketed).¹⁶ The **Imperial War Museum**²⁴ offers interactive galleries exploring the impact of war.³⁰ At the **National Maritime Museum**²¹, families can explore the Ahoy! children's gallery (booking recommended)³² and the Pirates exhibition.¹⁶ A visit to the historic **Tower of London**¹⁴ includes entertaining Beefeater tours (free with entry)²⁴ and the chance to see the Crown Jewels.²⁸ The Tower is also hosting a poignant VE Day 80th Anniversary display of ceramic poppies until November 11th.¹⁶ Kid-friendly private tours are also available.⁴⁵ Families can step aboard the legendary sailing ship **Cutty Sark**²¹ to learn about its history.²¹ For older children and teenagers seeking a thrill, the **London Dungeon**²¹ offers thrilling rides and delves into the city's chilling past.²¹ Other museums worth considering include the Bank of England Museum³³, the Grant Museum of Zoology³³, Pollock's Toy Museum³³, the RAF Museum²² with its playground²², Chelsea FC Stadium Tours²⁵, Arsenal Football Club Tour²⁵, the Peter Harrison Planetarium³³, the Cartoon Museum³⁰, the Museum of the Home³¹, the Foundling Museum³¹, Eltham Palace And Gardens³¹, Fulham Palace House & Gardens³¹, Gunnersbury Park Museum³¹, the London Museum of Water & Steam²⁴, Osterley Park and House¹⁶, Hampton Court Palace¹⁷ with its enchanting Magic Garden¹⁷ and the Tulip Festival closing this weekend²⁷ (often hosting kid-friendly events⁵⁴), Chiswick House & Gardens³¹, Kenwood House³¹, Bruce Castle³¹, Headstone Manor & Museum³¹, Keats House³¹, the National Portrait Gallery³¹, Tate Britain³¹, the Royal Academy of Arts³¹, the National Gallery³¹ (offering kid-friendly private tours⁴⁵), Tate Modern²¹ (free entry²⁴), the Design Museum²⁶ with its Splash! exhibition²⁶, the Old Operating Theatre Museum³⁰, the Clink Prison Museum³⁰, the Churchill War Rooms²⁴ (booking recommended²⁴), the Wallace Collection¹⁵ (free entry¹⁵), Somerset House²⁴, the Science Gallery¹⁶ (Vital Signs exhibition ends May 17th), and the V&A East Storehouse¹⁵ opening on May 31st (with soft previews from May 19th) featuring a David Bowie display. Finally, the King's Galleries at Buckingham Palace¹⁶ are hosting The Edwardians: Age of Elegance exhibition.

Indoor Play and Activity Centres

For days when the weather isn't cooperating or when children need to burn off some extra energy, London offers a wide array of indoor play and activity centres. **Flip Out Canary Wharf** ⁶⁵ is one of the largest, featuring soft play, Laser Quest, interactive football, slides, crazy karts, and bumper cars (note: no trampolines). It will be open from 10 am to 8 pm on the bank holiday ⁶⁶, and booking is recommended. ⁶⁶ Other Flip Out locations include Brent Cross. ⁶⁷ **Babylon Park** in Camden ⁶⁸ offers a unique experience as an underground theme park with rides, VR experiences, arcade games, and soft play areas for both toddlers and older children. Entry is free, with options to pay per ride/game or purchase unlimited access tickets. It's advisable to check the Fever app or website for their bank holiday opening hours and to book tickets. ⁶⁸ **Kidspace** in Croydon and Romford ⁵⁵ is a behemoth of soft play, featuring slides, climbing walls, go-karts, mini-golf, and ball blasters, particularly suitable for older children. Other indoor play options include Gambado ⁶⁷, Kidzmania ⁶⁷, Kubz Klub ⁶⁷, N20 KidsClub ⁶⁷, ClownTown ⁶⁷ (pre-booked sessions with a separate area for under 3s), Topsy Turvy World ⁶⁷, Kidz Adventure Playzone ⁶⁷ with a large play frame and dedicated baby/toddler areas, and Big Little Fun in Greenwich ⁶⁷ offering soft play with interactive zones.

The **Better** leisure centres ⁶⁹ across London also host soft play areas with multi-layered climbing frames, ball pits, and mazes (check their website for specific locations and opening times). Swiss Cottage Leisure Centre ⁶⁹ recently updated its soft play area, which is ideal for younger children, while Talacre Leisure Centre ⁶⁹ offers an under-5s "baby gym" session and a more traditional soft play structure called Treetops. Booking for Better centres is typically done via their app. The **Sherriff Centre** in West Hampstead ⁵⁵ provides a soft play area within the unique setting of St James Church. **Sammy's Soft Play at YogoLoft** in Queen's Park ⁵⁵ is a clean and well-maintained option suitable for children under 5, with a vegetarian/vegan cafe on-site. **Inflata Nation** in Colindale ⁵⁵ offers a bouncy experience with inflatable slides, an obstacle course, and bouncy bubbles. **Ding Dong Fun Bus** in Tottenham ⁵⁵

is a soft play centre with a fun name and a variety of platforms, slides, and ball pits. Other notable indoor play spaces include Bella Boos⁷¹ with a candy theme, Tiny Tigers⁷¹ (a play cafe), Rainbow Soft Play & Cafe⁶⁹ with locations in Cockfosters and New Southgate, Toby's Adventure Club in Streatham⁷¹, Maggie & Rose in Islington⁶⁹ featuring a play kitchen, and Bertie and Boo's Adventure Island.⁷¹ Playbox in N1⁶⁹ is a stylish role-play cafe designed for children aged 0-6. Sobell Leisure Centre²² boasts an impressive soft play area. For those seeking more traditional playgrounds, Alexandra Road Park²² offers three playgrounds for different age groups, while Kilburn Park Road²² has play areas for both little ones and older children. Harringay Ladder²² features innovative play equipment, and Finsbury Park²² has three playgrounds. Colindale Park²², Stationers Park in Crouch End²², Crumbles Castle Playground in Islington²², Homerton Grove Adventure Playground¹⁷, Toffee Park Adventure Playground in Islington¹⁷, Triangle Adventure Playground in Lambeth¹⁷, Three Corners Adventure Playground¹⁷, Shakespeare Walk Adventure Playground¹⁷, and Brent Cross Town Playground²² provide further options. For trampoline fun, consider O2 Oxygen Trampoline Park in North Greenwich⁵⁶ (check for age restrictions). It's worth noting that Wonderland: Adult Soft Play in Palmers Green⁷² is an adult-only venue and not suitable for children. For a blend of play and storytelling, Discover Children's Story Centre in Stratford²⁹ offers interactive experiences.

The Magic of Theatre and Shows

London's vibrant theatre scene offers a plethora of family-friendly productions. In the West End, long-running hits like **The Lion King**¹⁰ at the Lyceum Theatre and **Matilda The Musical**¹⁰ at the Cambridge Theatre continue to enchant audiences. **Wicked**¹⁰ at the Apollo Victoria Theatre is another popular choice. For older children, **Harry Potter and the Cursed Child**²⁴ at the Palace Theatre offers a magical experience. Families can also enjoy the feel-good musical **Mamma Mia!**²⁶ at the Novello Theatre, or the hilarious **The Play That Goes Wrong**¹⁰ at the Duchess Theatre. Disney's **Frozen**²⁴ is another captivating option. For a unique experience, consider **Shrek's Adventure! London**¹⁰, a walk-and-ride adventure. **Paddington The Musical**⁶¹ is having its world premiere in the West End, and the **Paddington Bear Experience**¹⁰ offers further opportunities to meet the beloved bear. Other family-friendly shows running include **The Lightning Thief: The Percy Jackson Musical**²¹ at The Other Palace, **Back to the Future**²¹, **Clueless the musical**²⁶ at the Trafalgar Theatre, **The Curious Case of Benjamin Button**²⁶ at the Ambassadors Theatre, **My Neighbour Totoro**¹⁰ at the Gillian Lynne Theatre, **Six the Musical**⁷⁴ at the Vaudeville Theatre, and **Starlight Express**⁶¹ at the Troubadour Wembley Park.

For more intimate and engaging performances, London's smaller theatres offer

delightful options. The **Little Angel Theatre**²⁹ will be presenting *A Squash and a Squeeze* from May 1st to May 10th, 2025⁷⁵, aimed at ages 3-8. They also offer Angel's Little Explorers workshops for babies and toddlers starting from May 2nd, 2025.⁷⁵ *The Paper Dolls* will run from May 10th to July 20th, 2025⁷⁴ (ages 3-8), followed by *Krafty the Urban Fox: Tales from the Tower Block* from May 17th to July 27th, 2025⁷⁴ (ages 2-5), and *Overheard in a Tower Block* from May 22nd to July 27th, 2025⁷⁴ (for everyone over 7). The **Unicorn Theatre**²⁹ will be showing *The Koala Who Could* from May 20th to June 1st, 2025.⁵⁰ At the **Polka Theatre** in Wimbledon⁷⁴, families can catch *Chicken Licken* until May 11th, 2025⁷⁴, *Let's Build!* until June 29th, 2025⁷⁴, and *The Vanishing Forest* from May 24th to June 1st, 2025.⁵⁰ **Shakespeare's Globe**²⁵ will be offering family workshops from May 25th to 31st for *A Midsummer Night's Dream* and *Romeo and Juliet*⁷⁶, as well as a Family Storytelling of *A Midsummer Night's Dream* on May 24th and 25th.⁷⁶

The bank holiday weekend also features several special performances and events. **Carnival: Family Edit** at Southbank Centre on May 3rd, 2025¹⁶ is a collaboration between Aurora and Frantic Assembly.⁷⁷ On the same day, families can enjoy the **Big Fish Little Fish family rave** at Barking Riverside⁶³, with flower-themed clothing encouraged. The Royal Albert Hall will host **The Enchanted Cinema: Ghibli's Forest**¹⁶, an audio-visual experience for young children. **Showdown**, an acrobatics and circus skills competition, will take place at The Albany in Deptford.⁶³ The **Peckham Fringe Festival**⁶³ will be ongoing with various performances at Theatre Peckham and Canada Water Theatre. **Polygon Live LDN**, a spatial audio festival, will be held at Crystal Palace Park from May 2nd to 4th, 2025.²⁶ Regent's Park Open Air Theatre might have early season performances.¹⁰ Finally, Southbank Centre's Multitudes festival¹⁶ may still have family-friendly events on its final weekend (until May 3rd). The variety of special performances highlights the bank holiday as a time for unique family entertainment beyond the regular theatre offerings.

Free and Affordable Family Fun

London offers a wealth of free and affordable activities for families. Many of its world-renowned museums and galleries provide free entry, including the main galleries of the Science Museum ²⁴, the Natural History Museum ²⁴, the British Museum (for children under 16) ²⁴, the Museum of London Docklands ²⁹, the Young V&A ²³, the National Maritime Museum ²⁹, the National Gallery ³¹, Tate Modern ²¹, and the Wallace Collection.¹⁵ While some special exhibitions at the Horniman Museum and Gardens ¹⁶ may require tickets, the grounds and some exhibitions are free. Other free museums include the Museum of the Home ³¹, Foundling Museum (some areas) ³¹, and the Serpentine Galleries (including Serpentine South) ¹⁶, which will be hosting a free exhibition by Giuseppe Penone with sculptures extending into the Royal Parks. On May 3rd, the Natural History Museum will host the free Generation Hope event, a program created by young people for young people.⁶³ The V&A Museum will also offer a free performance of Shadow Kingdom: Shadow Puppetry in Motion on May 3rd.¹⁶ Southbank Centre will host free events on May 3rd, including Relaxed Sessions with Body Odyssey ⁷⁷ and Saturday Sessions with Body Odyssey.⁷⁷ While the main Moomin 80 celebrations at Southbank Centre occur later in May ⁵⁰, it's worth checking for any early free activities.

London's parks provide ample opportunities for free fun. Families can explore the Royal Parks and their numerous playgrounds ¹¹, enjoy picnics ¹³, go for nature walks and spot wildlife.²⁰ Local parks and playgrounds also offer free recreational spaces.¹² Visiting city farms like Mudchute, Vauxhall, and Brick Lane ²⁴ provides a free way to interact with animals. Walking along Regent's Canal ²⁸, looking for the green parrots in Hyde Park ²⁸, and watching the pelican feeding in St. James's Park ²⁸ are all free activities. Exploring the pocket parks of the Square Mile ²⁰ and visiting the River Lee Country Park ²⁰ also offer free outdoor experiences.

Throughout the bank holiday weekend, several free events and festivals will be taking place. The Canalway Cavalcade in Little Venice (May 3rd-5th, 2025) ⁶³ is a vibrant canal boat festival with live music and children's activities. Vesna Fest at Woolwich Works (May 2nd-9th) ⁶³ celebrates Ukrainian culture and creativity with many free activities. While Chelsea in Bloom and Belgravia in Bloom ¹⁶ occur later in May, it's worth checking if any early installations are already in place. The Play in the Park programme ¹⁶ offers free nature-inspired activities in various Royal Parks. East London's only free-to-play minigolf in Canary Wharf ¹⁶ provides a fun challenge. Although Kingswood Arts & Dulwich Festival Family Fun Day! ¹⁶ is on May 10th, other free elements of the Dulwich Festival (May 9th-18th) might be worth exploring. Ted's

Space Adventure at Royal Observatory Greenwich ¹⁶ is a free weekend planetarium show for young children. Tots at the Docks at the Museum of London Docklands ¹⁶ offers free monthly play sessions (check dates). The Southern Outfall open day at Crossness Pumping Station on May 3rd ⁶³ provides a unique free experience. Browsing the Indie Jewellers' Market ⁶³ is free, and while the Blackhorse Beer Mile's 3rd Birthday celebration ²⁷ on May 4th may involve costs, it's worth checking for any free elements. Urban Village Fête at Greenwich Peninsula on May 18th ¹⁵ offers free entry. Listening to the debates at Speaker's Corner in Hyde Park on Sundays ¹³ is a unique free experience. Wandering through Camden Market ⁵⁴ is free, though purchases will incur costs. Finally, exploring the street art in Shoreditch ²⁴ offers a free cultural experience. The sheer number of free activities available demonstrates that families can enjoy a fantastic bank holiday weekend in London without breaking the bank.

To make the most of a bank holiday on a budget, consider packing your own snacks and drinks, taking advantage of free museum entry, seeking out free events and festivals, utilizing public transport or walking, and having a picnic in one of London's beautiful parks. Checking for family ticket deals for paid attractions can also help reduce costs. While Kids Week offering free West End tickets is in the summer ⁷³, it's a good option to keep in mind for future holidays. Similarly, National Rail's Days Out Guide ²³ can offer 2FOR1 tickets to some attractions.

For families seeking truly unique and themed experiences, London has much to offer. Stepping into the world of wizardry at the **Warner Bros. Studio Tour London - The Making of Harry Potter** ¹⁰ is an unforgettable experience (book tickets in advance ²⁵). Exploring the underwater world at the **SEA LIFE London Aquarium** ¹⁰ and rubbing shoulders with lifelike figures at **Madame Tussauds London** ²¹ (featuring an ongoing Star Wars Exhibition ³⁴) are also popular choices. Taking a ride on the iconic **London Eye** ¹⁰ offers breathtaking city views, as does a visit to **The Shard Viewing Gallery** ³³ or the chance to climb the roof of the O2 at **Up at The O2**.²¹ For thrill-seekers, a day trip to **Chessington World of Adventures** ¹⁰, **LEGOLAND Windsor** ¹⁰, or **Thorpe Park** ¹⁰ is a must. The **Paradox Museum** ²¹ offers immersive and mind-bending exhibits. Families can also engage in a life-sized game at **Monopoly Lifesized** ²¹ or embark on an immersive journey through space at **The Moonwalkers: A Journey with Tom Hanks at Lightroom**.²¹

London also offers a fantastic selection of family-friendly walking tours. **London Highlights Walking Tour for Children and Families** by Pinocchio Tours ⁷⁹ covers key landmarks and is specifically designed for children. Numerous **Harry Potter Walking**

Tours ²⁴ allow fans to explore filming locations from the beloved series. Viator offers a **London The Best of Harry Potter Guided Tour (Free for Kids)** ⁴⁵ and a **London Tootbus Kids Tour** ⁴⁵ with live commentary. For museum explorations, consider the **Private London British Museum Tour for Kids and Families** ⁴⁵, **Kid-Friendly Private Tower of London Tour** ⁴⁵, **Kid-Friendly Tour: Tower of London and Tower Bridge Entry** ⁴⁵, **Kid-Friendly Natural History Museum & Dinosaurs Private Guided Tour** ⁴⁵, and **Kid-Friendly National Gallery Tour**.⁴⁵ Other options include the **London Highlights Family-Friendly Walking Tour** ⁴⁵ and **National Gallery of London Guided Tour for children and families** ⁴⁵, both offered by Viator. London Walks' **London Film, TV & Book Trail for Kids & Grown-up Kids** ⁸⁰ explores locations from various films, TV shows, and children's books (currently unavailable but might be bookable privately). The City of London offers a self-guided **City of London Children's Trail** ³⁷ with three routes and an activity map. Fun London Tours provides unique walks like the **Secret Old London Tour**, **London's Dark History Tour**, **London's Lost City Tour**, and **London's Grime & Punishment Tour**.⁸¹ Meet the Locals for Families ⁴⁶ offers a variety of family-focused tours, including British Museum treasure hunts and Harry Potter tours. Context Travel ⁶⁴ provides interactive tours led by experts, and London Perfect ²⁵ offers a Harry Potter Film Locations walking tour. The sheer number of themed walking tours tailored for families underscores the popularity of this engaging way to discover London's treasures with children. Finally, the Ruislip Lido Railway Gala Weekend (May 3rd-5th, 2025) ⁶³ offers a special bank holiday event for train enthusiasts.

Creative Workshops and Classes

For hands-on and creative activities, families can explore various workshops and classes. Southbank Centre ⁷⁷ offers ongoing WordPlay sessions and a specific WordPlay: Sounds and Scribbles event on May 23rd. The V&A Museum ⁵⁷ has Mini Play sessions for babies and toddlers throughout May, an ongoing Family Design Challenge, a Create! Studio for Families: Nature workshop on May 10th, a Family Workshop (7-14): Tempera Painting on May 30th, and Digital Kids: Create Stories with Clay from May 27th to 30th. Japan House London ⁸² is hosting family workshops on making kumiko latticework coasters from April 29th to May 6th, 2025. While the Family Chocolate Making Workshop at Chelsea Physic Garden ¹⁶ is on May 26th, it might be worth checking for other family events. Kingswood Arts & Dulwich Festival ¹⁶ (May 9th-18th) will feature a family fun day with various creative workshops on May 10th. Art CLASS London ⁸³ might be offering half-term classes during the bank holiday (check their website for specific details). Vesna Fest at Woolwich Works (May 2nd-9th) ⁶³ includes a craft fair and dance workshops. While many family-oriented

workshops are scheduled around the May half-term later in the month, there are still opportunities for creative engagement during the Early May bank holiday.

Planning Your Perfect Bank Holiday

To ensure a smooth and enjoyable bank holiday weekend, consider the ages and interests of your children when selecting activities. Booking tickets in advance for popular attractions and shows is highly recommended, especially during a busy bank holiday.¹⁰ Always check the opening hours and any special bank holiday schedules for venues. Plan your transportation in advance, keeping in mind that public transport can be crowded; walking or cycling might be good options for shorter distances.⁵⁴ Remember to pack essentials like snacks, drinks, and comfortable shoes. Be prepared for potential queues at popular spots and look out for family ticket options and discounts. Combining indoor and outdoor activities will help cater to different weather conditions. Finally, avoid over-scheduling; leave some time for relaxation and spontaneous fun.
